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State gets \$808,000 to hire 140 workers

Arizona has received federal grants totaling \$808,000 to employ 140 residents for one year, Gov. Raul Castro said Friday.

The grants, through the Four Corners Regional Commission, will pay 60 people in Apache County, 45 in Mohave County, 20 on the Hualapai Indian Reservation and 15 in Navajo County.

Price council chief resigns

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Ford Friday accepted "with regret and with deepest gratitude" the resignation of Albert Rees as director of the Council on Wage and Price Stability.

Rees will become a provost at Princeton University.

Sources say Rees will be replaced by Michael H. Moskow, an assistant secretary in the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

House panel OKs bill for public work

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House Appropriations Committee Friday approved a \$9.3 billion public works money bill, with more than half of it earmarked for energy research and development projects.

The panel also approved a \$7.1 billion measure to fund the departments of State, Justice, Commerce, the federal judiciary and several independent agencies.

Both measures would provide appropriations for a 15-month period, starting July 1.

The public works bill — which exceeds President Ford's budget requests by \$252 million — gives the Energy Research and Development Administration \$5 billion, some \$44 million more than Ford proposed for ERDA.

The committee action came as the House took up the ERDA authorization measure, which carries a spending ceiling of \$5.8 billion.

The Apache county people will be employed in building renovation, fencing projects, road and bridge improvement, and agricultural water projects. The work will be handled by the Office of Navajo Economic Opportunity, which will receive \$200,000 to pay them.

The Mohave County Parks Department will receive \$308,000 to pay employes working on a special activities and recreational area of 1,082 acres near Lake Havasu City.

On the Hualapai reservation at Peach Springs, 20 persons will be employed at the Hualapai doll factory with a \$100,000 grant.

In Navajo County, the Board of Supervisors will use a \$100,000 grant to hire 15 unskilled and semiskilled workers for improvement of community facilities.

Another \$100,000 project at Navajo Community College will involve beautification of Tsaile Lake.

ble way to avoid rekindling them" with excessive federal spending.

Nessen said the new figures were interpreted as "a continuation of the significant reduction of inflationary pressures" that started to appear in retail sales late last year.

He said Ford thinks the annual rate of increase — 6 per cent when seasonably adjusted — is too high, but that he was glad to see that the present rate is down to about half of last year's.

When asked if Ford might now reconsider his opposition to new federal spending that could cut unemployment, Nessen said "absolutely not."

He said the federal deficit for next fiscal year, starting July 1, is virtually certain to go beyond \$60 billion, and he said Ford would resist efforts to push that figure higher.

There were higher prices for some items in May, including meat, gasoline and used cars.

The price of beef and veal jumped 9.3 per cent on a seasonally adjusted basis during the month, the biggest monthly increase on record, and pork and poultry prices also advanced.

Meat prices normally decline during May.

Pate said he doesn't think meat prices will continue to rise much above current levels.

Motorists had to pay an extra penny for a gallon of gasoline, averaging 55 cents for regular and 59 cents for premium.

The increase apparently was due to the tariff on oil imports imposed by Ford.

The Labor Department said overall food prices increased five-tenths of 1 per cent in May, largely because of the
